In 2017, the Centers for Disease Control contacted Santa Clara County due to the unusually high number of teen suicides occurring within its jurisdiction. Recommendations from the study suggested a lack of available mental health resources was contributing to this risk. Santa Clara County Behavioral Health (SCCBH) applied and was awarded a Mental Health Services Act grant to help develop and fund mobile mental health services for this at-risk population.

The San Jose Police Department was invited to take advantage of this opportunity and agreed to partner with the SCCBH to create a Psychiatric Emergency Response Team (PERT). The implementation of a PERT team within the Department will provide the ability to collaboratively increase public safety and reduce recidivism among the high-risk individuals with mental illness.

The PERT team is a one-year pilot program that provides the Department the opportunity to employ a behavioral health clinician to respond, in real, time to patrol events with a law enforcement PERT officer. This collaboration between the Department and SCCBH will strive to increase public safety and provide rapid interventions and positive outcomes to those individuals in a mental health crisis by de-escalating the situation and stabilizing the person using the least restrictive means possible. Once the situation has been stabilized, the PERT team will determine the most appropriate level of care while supporting the needs and safety of the individual in crisis. When the pilot program expires, the overall effectiveness of the program will be evaluated and determine if it should be extended, modified, terminated, or adopted.

PERT RESPONSIBILITES:

The PERT team will provide and support Department members by performing the following duties:

- Participate in proactive responses for high-risk individuals with mental illness in a collaborative manner between Behavioral Health and the San Jose Police Department.
- Conduct mental health evaluations and assessments of individuals, including crisis screening, for persons with serious mental illness including frequent users of emergency psychiatric services.
- Assist in determining the appropriate services supporting individuals needs and safety.
- Ensure requirements for detention and transportation pursuant to Welfare & Institutions Code section 5150 are met and documentation supporting this decision is completed properly.

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• Follow up with individuals as necessary to ensure continued positive outcomes and decrease the need for further law enforcement intervention.

- Conduct presentations to educate others about the mission and focus of PERT.
- Provide mental health training and expertise to Department members.

PERT DEPLOYMENT:

The PERT team may be called upon for response to locations where police contact is made with a subject reasonably deemed to be suffering from a mental health crisis. In evaluating the incident, Officers on scene should evaluate the circumstances surrounding the call and determine if a PERT response would assist in bringing a more positive resolution to the situation. Things to consider before requesting a PERT response:

- Potential for violence
- Wanted subject
- Crimes committed by the subject
- Subject injuries

- Law enforcement history with subject
- Actions/Statements of the subject
- Age of the subject
- Location of subject
